New look of the IPCC website (with photos)

Simplified design to enable easier access to information about the IPCC

(HONG KONG – 27 April 2015) The Independent Police Complaints Council (IPCC) today announced the official launch of its new website at www.ipcc.gov.hk. The newly designed website features a sliding banner at a prominent position which highlights the latest activities of the IPCC, information boxes to enable easy access to important information of the IPCC and an embedded YouTube player which directly links to the IPCC YouTube channel. The new website complies with the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0 Level AA requirements and has a mobile version to accommodate the various needs of the public.

The main principles of the new website's design are to attract visitors to browse different sections of the website with an eye-catching and user-friendly home page, to improve the ease of navigation through better categorisation of materials, to facilitate easier access to information through a simplified structure and to showcase the IPCC's social media capacity through the embedded YouTube player on the home page.

At the top of the home page, visitors can view snapshots of the IPCC's latest activities, such as the upcoming TV drama series *IPCC Files*, through five major banners that rotate automatically. When clicked, the banner will lead the visitor to more detailed information about the activity. Four main information icons offer quick and easy access to essential information about the IPCC, such as the two-tier police complaints system, IPCC annual reports and frequently asked questions. The embedded YouTube player also shows the latest uploaded videos on the IPCC YouTube player.

The latest issue of IPCC's quarterly newsletter is also featured on the home page to enable visitors to easily keep up to date with the IPCC's activities. The newsletter can now be downloaded by section instead of having to download the whole publication so that readers can directly access the content they are interested in. The same new format is applied to the IPCC Reports as well.

Other new features include a meeting notification on the home page when there is an upcoming Open Meeting between IPCC and CAPO. When clicked, visitors are directed to the

press invitation which contains the meeting agenda and information on how to make reservations to observe the Open Meetings. At the bottom of the home page, the drop-down site map offers a clear overview of the various sections and sub-sections so that visitors can easily locate their target information.

New content has also been added to the website, such as photos and descriptions of the IPCC's engagement with various stakeholders, press events and a full list of all the currently appointed IPCC Observers.

The new IPCC website is designed to be accessible to all members of the public, including those with disabilities and special needs. The IPCC is committed to ensuring that the new website complies with the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0 Level AA requirements.

A mobile version has also been developed to enable the public to access information about the IPCC on smartphones and other mobile devices.

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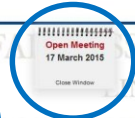

1 February 2015

Apart from the arrangements by the Police, for the first time, the IPCC was invited by Civil Human Rights Front (CHRF) to observe with their team. Mr Larry Kwok Lam-kwong (Chairman), Hon Chan Kin-por (Vice-Chairman), Hon Chris Cheung Wah-lung (Vice-Chairman), Hon Tony Tse Wai-chuen (Vice-Chairman), Dr Chan Pui-kwong, Mr Clement Tao Kwok-lau, Ir Dr Vincent Simon Ho, Mr Arthur Luk Yee-shun, Ms Ann So Lai-chun, Dr Eric Cheng Kam-chung, Mr Richard Ho Kam-wing and Mr Herman Hui Chung-shing joined the Police's observation team of the 1 February procession, while Mr Simon Ip Shing-hing, Ms Noeline Lau Yuk-kuen, Ms Sandy Wong Hang-ye, and Dr Eugene Chan Yiu-leung observed the procession alongside CHRF. They were later joined by Ms Mary Wong Tak-lan, Mr Adrian Yip Chun-to, Mr Edwin Cheng Shing-lung, Mr John Yan Mang-ye and Professor Alfred Chan Cheung-ming to observe the procession's ending point at Central and the public meeting at Chater Road Pedestrian Precinct.



17 December 2014

Mr Larry Kwok Lam-kwong, Mr Eric Cheng Tat-ming, Mr Simon Ip Shing-hing, Ms Noeline Lau Yuk-kuen, Mr Adrian Yip Chun-to, Mr Edwin Cheng Shing-lung and Mr Clement Tao Kwok-lau met with representatives from the Civil Human Rights Front (CHRF). During the meeting, CHRF representatives raised issues concerning police abuse of power, failure to maintain political neutrality, the unreasonable designation of cordoned-off areas and the registration of citizens' ID numbers during the Occupy Movement. The CHRF also recommended that the IPCC consider setting up a video team to record future protests. The IPCC will discuss these matters internally and raise these issues with the Police.

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5 March 2015

A media briefing was held to release the fifteenth issue of the IPCC Newsletter. Mr Larry Kwok Lam-kwong (Chairman), Mr Edwin Cheng Shing-lung (Chairman of the Publicity and Survey Committee) and Mr Daniel Mui (Deputy Secretary-General) presented highlights of the IPCC's latest activities, and drew attention to the cover story on the new TV drama series IPCC Files, jointly produced by the IPCC and RTHK. 3 December 2014
